or a synagogue community to succeed in becoming and remaining vital, leadership must recognize that congregants and potential congregants require multiple avenues of engagement because—not to state the obvious—people are different. When it comes to our Membership Engagement Initiative, we have already featured two completely different avenues of engagement: 1) Guess Who is Coming to Shabbes? (a program designed to teach Home Shabbat practices) and 2) POWER (Philadelphians Organized to Witness, Empower, & Rebuild—a Social Action opportunity).

While many of the same people may interested in both avenues, each may certainly appeal to different people, because—at the risk of repetition—people are different.

An additional avenue of engagement involves Arts & Culture. In our congregation, we have a veritable cornucopia of Arts & Culture activities in which our own talented members participate. What follows is a just a sampling of some these activities that will be taking place in the coming months. These are only activities and events about which I was informed. I am sure there are many other Arts & Culture events in which our congregants are the featured artists, writers, or performers. I would love to make this information available to our Synagogue community on a regular basis.

On a lark, I caught a show that SHS member Michael Yudell put on in collaboration with an improvisation group. The show, part of the Philly Fringe festival, was about the history of public health. Public health? Funny? Public health? Hilarious.

World-famous photographer/artist Judy Gelles has a spectacular, moving, and thought-provoking exhibit entitled "Fourth Grade Project" that features photos and a video. I've seen it before. It is truly something. You can see this exhibit at the Gallery at 543 Urban Outfitters, Inc. at the Navy Yard, Philadelphia (M-F, 8 AM until 5 PM). Hurry ... it ends on October 3.

Noah Herman, who grew up in this congregation and who has taught in our religious school and Playschool, is currently directing the 1812 Productions of *Bunny Bunny*, an imaginary biography of the life of Saturday Night Live actress Gilda Radner; see this production at the Walnut Street Theatre through October 27.

President's Column
Highlights From My Kol
Nidre Address

elcome back! I know that we often feel like we're not ready to come back from the summer break and return to fall activities, but this year, the early holiday schedule has brought us back sooner than usual. It's hard to believe that by early October we've already celebrated the High Holy Days! I would like to take this opportunity to reiterate what I spoke to you about on Kol Nidre.

Traditionally, the High Holy Days offers those of us in the leadership a chance to address the congregation as a whole. We take the time during the services, when so many of you are present, to speak for a bit about what we've been up to, and what we are planning for the year ahead. I think we accomplished a lot last year, and this fall already looks like it will be full of new opportunities for all of us.

The major goal we achieved last year was the establishment of the Membership Engagement Initiative, which was created to provide ways for the members to become more connected to the community. I have written about this in my previous columns, and you have heard through other articles how this initiative got started, so I'm not going to repeat what you already know. I will say, however, that it was with a great deal of excitement and energy that we embraced the ideas of Dr. Ron Wolfson, both from reading his book and by talking with him when he conducted a Shabbaton about *The Spirituality of Welcoming* last year.

We took away many ideas from that weekend, and we have already implemented many of them. We have expanded our activities by organizing a number of different engagement groups that focus on social activities, musical functions, and tikkun olam. Members have already organized a trip to Fran Gallun's gallery opening, held a group discussion about Hannah Arendt after watching a movie at the Ritz, and planned a movie night at the Synagogue for school families.

We have also made some programmatic changes that will include member engagement as a core goal in everything we do.

First, thanks to Debbie Stewart's leadership, we now have a program called "Shul Guides." Many of you have volunteered to be guides for new members or families, helping them understand what makes this place special, and hopefully learning from them, what will make it better still.

A second new undertaking involves our association with POWER, a multi-denominational, faith-based organization that works to influence our local and regional government to make changes critical to develop true social justice within our city. You have heard, I am sure, about this group through various communications over the last six months, and many of you learned even more during the break on Yom Kippur when a representative from POWER was invited to speak. As contributing members to this organization, we now have SHS representatives on POWER's Board. Congratulations to Harry Oxman and Carl Levitsky, who will serve in this capacity. We're excited to learn how we can be part of this larger group and contribute to the city we love. Since Kol Nidre, many of our members and leaders attended meetings about the school budget and fair wages. I look forward to sharing more accomplishments with you over the coming year.

A third way that we have begun to engage our members involves our home base – literally. The idea of increasing our connection to Judaism through Shabbat meals is very primal – and whenever we discussed it we got excited. We have developed several events around the sharing of Shabbat meals.

Last spring, Bonny Hohenberger organized open Shabbat dinners for members after Friday night services, which got us rolling. We had more of these dinners hosted over the summer, proving that in Philadelphia it is possible to be Jewish and stay in town on Friday night. Also, I am excited to announce that we had our inaugural summer "Havdalah down the Shore" hosted by Walter and Margie Ferst and David and Sayde Ladov. I hope this wonderful event will be repeated again next summer, with your help. The success of these events inspired this fall's "Guess Who's Coming to Shabbes" program, which will have its debut on November 15 and 16. After the Rabbi talked about this on Rosh Hashanah, we had over 30 families volunteer to host or co-host—a terrific response!

I want to thank David Ladov for making a clear and impassioned appeal at Rosh Hashanah to make the case for Annual Giving. Within the next month, you will be receiving a reminder about this appeal, which focused on the idea that charity begins at home—that we all need to understand that what makes our community strong is its diversity. Our members have diverse economic circumstances; some members have limited or no ability to pay for membership and other expenses. David encouraged all who are capable of doing so to consider making a contribution that would help pay for another member who cannot pay full fees. The was refreshing in its clarity simplicity, and I want to thank those of you who responded immediately and generously. We have not yet reached our goal, but we're on our way. I ask the rest of you to remember David's thoughtful request as you decide what amount you will give for your annual contribution.

I finished my words on Kol Nidre with another appeal—an appeal for your assistance. On Sukkot, I was inspired by Rabbi Winokur's words about the Etrog and Lulav—four species that represent four different groups within the Jewish community at large. Palm, willow, myrtle, and etrog. He referred to an analogy where taste represents learning, and aroma represents good deeds. The etrog has both, the palm has taste but not fragrance, the myrtle has aroma but no taste, and the willow has neither. Similarly, the Jewish community is made up of a range of people with different connections to Jewish learning and different levels of participation. Just as is the case with the Etrog and Lulav, our strength comes from binding together all the different groups. The fact that this analogy is an old one is reassuring, telling us that we're not the first group to face these differences in connection. For my appeal, I am asking that each of us try to find some way to be involved in synagogue as activities and programs slightly more than we did last yearwhether by attending a cultural event described in the Rabbi's column this month, participating in "Guess Who's Coming to Shabbes," or becoming involved in one of our engaging other activities. You can help strengthen our community.

Finally, encourage friends, family, and colleagues to join SHS so they will learn what makes us such a special Synagogue community.

he beginning of our school year has been busy with the High Holy Day season, and it was wonderful to celebrate Sukkot together with our students, parents, and grandparents at the Sukkot Family Service on September 22. As Tishrii passes and we welcome Heshvan, this is an exciting time for new Jewish exploration.

In Sunday School, our kindergarteners are learning about the earliest events in *Genesis*, while our first grade students discover new Hebrew letters and take a closer look at our Patriarchs and Matriarchs. As our second graders hone in on key Jewish heroes from the *Torah*, they are also preparing for our next family service on Saturday, October 5, when their class will be featured.

That service starts at 10:30 AM and will be followed by a delicious luncheon. Please join us to celebrate Shabbat together! Your RSVP is essential to ensure that there is plenty of food for everyone to enjoy. Our fall theme for our Hebrew School electives is "Jewish Life Around the World," so our students in grades 3-6 are beginning their intercontinental journeys...without having to wait for connecting flights! Third and fourth graders will experience the history, geography, sounds, visions, and tastes of Jewish life in Ethiopia, Spain, and Argentina; students in grades five and six will travel to France, Italy, and South Africa.

Our seventh grade class is almost a month into its study of the Sho'ah (the Holocaust), using graphic novels, documentary footage, poetry, and art. Our teachers have crafted a multifaceted approach to learning about this dark period of history, and our students began their study by considering early examples of European anti-Semitism, from the Church Fathers through medieval times.

Cantor's Column
The Calm After the
Spiritual Storm

he first three weeks of Tishri— Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, and following on their heels,

Sukkot—are high energy times. The head of the year, we call it. Not the beginning—that honor belongs to Nisan, the month of Passover. Tishri is rather the seventh month, a height from which we can look backward and forward.

For me, Ne'ilah is the most intense hour of the entire year. Adrenaline is coursing, and we're all on our feet, striving to get to the final shofar. For short bursts, as if we were in a race, we aim even higher, to the gates of repentance.

I went home exhausted and spent the next day groggily putting together my Sukkah. Working out the pattern of lashing the pieces together and tying the knots was all I could do, but when it was up it was homey and pretty. We ate in it as much as we could, and invited guests for dinners. It was very pleasant sitting outdoors with good wine, good food, and great company, being thankful for the holy gift of security without walls. Under the stars we floated on a high plane. It was completely different from the frenzied, desperate finale of Yom Kippur, but nevertheless well above the routine of being over-subscribed and catching meals as we can.

On Sh'mini Atzeret we said the prayer for rain, and reconciled ourselves to sitting inside watching drops hit the pavement. (It hasn't happened yet as I write this, but I have faith.) A final frenzy lifted our feet to dance with scrolls on Simhat Torah, and then it was over.

In one way it's a relief not to live in such high spiritual intensity. But don't we miss the excitement, the crowds, the nervous energy, the demands that pull us away from routine? With only a touch of irony we refer to the month following Tishri as Mar, "bitter," Heshvan, since, O Dear, there are no festivals in it. It's a long way to <u>H</u>anukkah, and the days stretch into darkness.

To sustain me to the Feast of Lights I mull over my impressions from that three-week succession of seminars on judgment, forgiveness, and grateful joy. To my mind come humility, as I reflect on how I never sing as well as I would like to; gratitude for the privilege of being a leader of prayer for such a generous and warm group of people; pride and satisfaction in how well my students chanted Haftarah and Torah, and failings at which I am still chipping away, and for which, I offered repentance on Yom Kippur. Those will give me more than enough to fill the coming weeks and months.

new school year has begun in the Playschool. Our teachers have been busy

welcoming all of our new and returning families. It is wonderful to see how enthusiastic the children are to come to preschool.

During the course of their day, the children will socialize with friends, create expressive art, listen to stories that will excite their imaginations, sing songs and recite rhymes that can be shared with their families, learn skills in preparation for Kindergarten, and experience the celebration of Jewish holidays and Shabbat. The children will also learn the social skills of sharing, taking turns, and participating in group activities. Often, the boys and girls make friendships that last long beyond the Playschool years.

Children in the 2-year-old classes are experiencing a school atmosphere for the first time. Each day, they have the opportunity to play, interact with friends, learn new songs and movement activities, ride bikes outdoors, listen to storybooks, and create unique art projects. During the first few weeks of Playschool, the boys and girls came to school for progressively lengthening periods of time to allow them to ease into the preschool schedule.

Most of the children in the 3 – 4-year-old class are returning Playschool students. These students were ready to come back to school to see their friends and to continue learning and having fun. We were excited to welcome many new Playschool students to this class, too. All of the children have been eager to participate in free playtime, circle time, calendar, story time, learning letters of the week, making art projects, riding bikes, singing songs, practicing yoga, and celebrating Shabbat.

Our Pre-K curriculum focuses on preparing our students to enter Kindergarten. In our two classes, the children learn reading readiness skills, counting and numbers, writing, language arts, community living, science, art, and Jewish holidays and themes.

Throughout the school year, the children will participate in a drama class that will encourage them to express themselves in fun and creative ways.

The Playschool also offers Afterschool Arts Clubs, every afternoon, from 12:30 PM until 3 PM. On Mondays, the children prepare healthy snacks in Cooking Club. Tuesdays are for learning about scihand-on scientific ence. with experiments. Wednesdays are for completing projects in Art Club. On Thursdays, the boys and girls participate in Movement Club that includes parachute games, obstacle course activities, dance, and aerobics. On Fridays, we have Music Club where the children learn new songs about the seasons, holidays, and Shabbat, or they sing songs just for fun. Children, who do not attend the Playschool, are welcome to attend Afterschool Arts. Please contact the Playschool office at gparris@societyhillsynagogue.org or 215.922.6590, ext. 28, for more information about enrolling your child in our afternoon programs.

On Thursday, October 10, the Pre-K classes will be taking a walking trip to visit a local fire station. There, they will learn about community helpers and fire safety.

Grandparents' and Special Friend's Day, for the children in the 3 – 4-year-old class and Pre-K classes, will be held on Friday, October 18. That evening, our Fall Shabbat Dinner (Social Hall) and Playschool Art Exhibit (Spruce Street Lobby) will take place. Original works of art, created by all of the children in the Playschool, will be on display.

On Tuesday, October 29, the children in the 3-4-year-old class will be taking the first of four trips to The Philadelphia Museum of Art to participate in the *Museum Looks and Picture Books* preschool program.

We hope to see all of our Playschool families at the Fall Shabbat Dinner and Art Exhibit on Friday, October 18.

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POWER Update

en members of the Social Action Committee attended POWER's Fall Leadership Assembly and came away better informed and inspired to action. In the next couple of months, we will be working to educate and engage SHS members to advocate for public policies that are just and fair, especially for middle— and low—income families.

Focusing on jobs, schools, and immigration, POWER's goals for the year ahead are specific and strategic: passage of a living wage law for the City of Philadelphia; enactment of a fair funding law for school systems throughout the State Pennsylvania; and citizenship for eleven million undocumented immigrants nationwide. The work ahead includes advocating for placement of a Living Wage Amendment on the May ballot, making school funding a top issue in the upcoming gubernatorial election, and providing a strong contribution to the national movement for immigration reform, among other major activities.

Are these goals ambitious? Yes! Important? Absolutely! Achievable? Yes, provided there are large numbers of supporters committed to action on behalf of the goals. To grow the number of people who are aware of and involved in POWER, member congregations will be holding house meetings across the city over the next two months. These meetings will be informal informational and sharing sessions for groups of eight to ten people. Several SHS Social Action Committee members have agreed to host house parties, but additional hosts are needed. If you are outraged about the dire state of the Philadelphia School System and would like to do something about it, while encouraging others to join you, please consider hosting a house party. Training in how to conduct a session will be provided

illy the Baaadly Behaving Bully Goat is a story, written in lighthearted rhyming verse, about a young goat named Billy who constantly picks on the other "kids" in his class. From stealing their lunch money to pulling their hair, Billy is making life miserable for his primary grade peers. When Mr. and Mrs. Goat realize that they have exhausted all of their own strategies to stop their son's unacceptable behavior, they finally seek help from "The Wise Old Goat Upon the Hill," a certified Goat Therapist. With a little bit of magic dust, some common sense, and family support—a brilliant plan is initiated to cure Billy of his bullying ways.

By describing the circumstances and feelings associated with bullying, *Billy the Baaadly Behaving Bully Goat* provides children with the opportunity to identify bullying behavior and share their personal experiences with bullying—either as an intimidator, a victim, or a witness. This story should be part of every child's personal and classroom book collection because it

can open the lines of communication between child and parent, or child and teacher, and promote the discussion of strategies for dealing with peer-related verbal or physical aggression.
