From the President's Desk

GUIDED BY OUR VALUES, PLANNING FOR OUR FUTURE: A SYNAGOGUE THAT REFLECTS US ALL

You may have read in my column previously that Society Hill Synagogue's Board of Directors is undertaking a **strategic planning process**. To that end, we have formed a **Strategic Planning Steering Committee** whose task it is to direct this process. This exercise was prompted by the recognition of **four issues** that we felt we wanted to address.



Our community gathered in the Sanctuary, laughing and clapping at our annual Rock Purimspiel put on by <u>H</u>azzan Jessi Roemer and an intergenerational cast; LilyFish

First, the synagogue has experienced significant growth over the past five years. Our membership has expanded from 285 households in 2021 to 375 in 2025. One of the by-products of this is that the Hebrew School now has over 100 students, overflowing their spaces in the Paula Kline Learning Center (PKLC), and creating a scarcity of office space for additional staff. Even though we can't predict how long this growth will continue, we need to address our space constraints now.

Second, even though we have solved a major accessibility problem of having a historic structure for a home by including an elevator in the annex connecting the historic building to the PKLC, the Bimah in our Sanctuary is still inaccessible to a number of members and guests who attend services, B'nei Mitzvah, and other celebrations. We are considering solutions that would provide access for all.

Third, we have to look at other ways that our growth has impacted our community. Are there additional issues beyond space needs that we should be looking at? Have some of our community's needs changed over time? Are there opportunities that our growth presents us with?

Fourth, we must ensure that we can financially support any outcomes of our planning process as well as affirm that Society Hill Synagogue will thrive well into the future.

In order to do all of this work, there must be a set of values by which we are guided. Rabbi Kamesar and a committee reviewed and refreshed our Mission, Vision, and Values statements, and the Board of Directors approved the document.

On the following page, you can see the fruit of their work, which we believe will guide us in seeking answers to our questions while staying true to the essence of who we are.

We intend to have a Board approved Strategic Plan in place by the end of 2026.

As each new issue is tackled, a committee will be activated or a task force will be formed. Our community members will be kept up to date and perhaps solicited for their opinion and/or expertise. This is an exciting time for Society Hill Synagogue!

OUR MISSION, VISION, AND VALUES

Mission

Society Hill Synagogue nourishes, strengthens, and inspires our members, their families, and the surrounding community through the rhythms and teachings of Jewish life.

Vision

Society Hill Synagogue envisions a vibrant intergenerational community in which we nourish our souls through prayer and tradition, care for one another, form new and lasting friendships, celebrate our joys together, deepen our minds through Torah and learning, and together help author the next chapter of Jewish life as we work to repair a broken world.

Values

Pluralism — We believe that a diversity of perspectives, backgrounds, and approaches to Jewish life strengthens us and helps us grow. Our services are based on Conservative liturgy while incorporating influences from the Reconstructionist, Renewal, and Reform movements, and beyond.

Kehilah/Community — We believe that life is lived most richly when woven together in the fabric of community: caring for one another when sick, providing shared space for one another's children, celebrating one another's joys, mourning one another's sorrows, and finding diverse opportunities to gather and connect.

Hakhlalah/Inclusion — We believe in the wisdom of making the riches of Jewish life accessible to all. It is our responsibility to build pathways that facilitate participation in Jewish life and to foster an environment of belonging for all those seeking Jewish community, including interfaith couples and families, LGBTQIA+ people, people of color, and people of all abilities.

Talmud Torah/Lifelong Learning — We believe learning is a fundamental part of Jewish living, and it infuses everything we do: from prayer services to Board meetings; from preschool to Hebrew School and throughout adulthood.

T'filah/Prayer — We believe prayer is a vital expression of Jewish life that can connect us to God, strengthen and nourish our soul, and help us form a relationship to mystery, strengthened through music, liturgy, and reflection.

Tzedek/Justice — We believe Judaism gives voice to the eternal call incumbent upon all of us to contribute to a more just world and that the synagogue is an important vehicle for mobilizing our collective efforts.

Klal Yisrael/All of Israel — We believe that fostering a connection to Israel — the people, the land, the country — is an essential component of synagogue life. We believe in the value of expressing and exploring our connection to the Jewish people worldwide and in our ancient homeland across a diversity of perspectives.



From the Rabbi's Desk

OUR GROWTH JOURNEY: WHERE WE GO FROM HERE

We talk about "growth" a lot at Society Hill Synagogue. Are we growing? If so, why? Is it going to continue or might it stop? Do we even want to continue to grow? What does that mean for our future? What planning do we need to do in relation to that?

As you can read in Synagogue President Lisa Eizen's Kesher article, the Board, staff, and clergy have carefully reviewed and revised our Mission, Vision, and Values statements as we engage in a strategic planning process to help us chart a course for the next chapter of life at Society Hill Synagogue. A "Mission Statement" typically articulates a community's purpose, why it exists; a "Vision Statement" is what it looks like as the community achieves that purpose; and a "Values Statement" is a list of the community's core beliefs in pursuit of that mission and vision.

We reviewed these statements because, as we have often shared recently, we indeed have grown a lot as a synagogue community over the past few years — 140 new households have joined since 2021, for a net increase, factoring in

attrition, of over 30%, and our Hebrew School has increased from 65 students to 105 students, a growth rate of nearly 80% over five years. We want to ensure that, as we grow, we remain keyed into the reasons Society Hill Synagogue was formed in the first place, and to the fundamental purpose that animates us each day.

As our new mission statement declares, "Society Hill Synagogue nourishes, strengthens, and inspires our members, their families, and the surrounding community through the rhythms and teachings of Jewish life."

Being Jewish isn't easy. Nor is being human, frankly. But those challenges invite us to ground ourselves in community, in tradition, and in meaning. We believe that as each of us engages with Society Hill Synagogue, we are able to draw upon experiences here that nourish, strengthen, and inspire us as we carry out the tasks that make up our lives.

I witness this each week. I witness how, on a Saturday morning after services, families and individuals of all ages, from

retirees to young couples chasing their toddlers, fill our Social Hall with laughter and connection over a Kiddush lunch. I witness how astonished people are when our Hebrew School students engage in a congregation-wide Torah discussion right alongside their elders, with insights as sharp as anyone else's, from 10:30 to 11:00 am in our Sanctuary each Saturday. I witness people who never really imagined a one-hour Friday night or two-hour Saturday morning service being their cup of tea becoming unable to imagine their weeks without at least one of those services, feeling themselves rejuvenated after each one. I witness a bevy of communal experiences — from weekly Mah Jongg games, to Book Club, to men's and women's groups (Men's Club and Rosh Hodesh), to visits from Israeli soccer stars, to meaningful commemorations of Yom HaZikaron and Yom Ha'Atzma'ut, in multiple expressions — enriching the lives of our members and the surrounding community.

I say this not to toot our own horn, though I do believe Society Hill Synagogue's longstanding approach of being deeply rooted in tradition, while also recognizing that at each juncture we need to make sure we are bringing that tradition to life through new teachings, through practices of inclusion, and through asking, frankly and open-heartedly, how ancient rhythms can be brought to bear in this moment. I say this to affirm that engaging with communities like Society Hill Synagogue — immersing ourselves in the rhythms of Jewish communal life — can do a great deal for our souls, our psyches, and ultimately, the communities and the families in which we take part, and therefore, the broader world.

So here at Society Hill Synagogue, growth is not just a number for us. We believe deeply in the tools we are wielding — or, really, the singular tool we are wielding: Jewish communal life. We believe we have been bequeathed by our ancestors a true gift: the gift of Jewish tradition, which nurtures community, and that it is our task at Society Hill Synagogue to deploy that gift — to help people find strength, nourishment, and inspiration through the rhythms and teachings of Jewish life; through service of God and community.

If we are striking a chord with people in our efforts to do that, we want to ensure that, going forward, we remain fully capable of welcoming new waves, new generations of people who come seeking Jewish community in the ways we express it here; who come needing the strength, nourishment, and inspiration that comes from engaging with the rhythms and teachings of Jewish life facilitated by Society Hill Synagogue and other communities like ours.

Part of strengthening our capacity to do that is by investing in the staff that supports this community. Last year, as part of our previous Strategic Plan from 2022, we recognized that we needed more expertise and capacity devoted to communicating who we are and what we have to offer to our community and beyond. So we hired a full-time Communications Manager, LilyFish Gomberg, who has been able to tell our story on a variety of platforms and in our regular communications, helping more people connect to the nourishment that is present at Society Hill Synagogue.

Similarly, because our Hebrew School has grown so much, we have expanded the role leading the Hebrew School from a parttime to a full-time position, recognizing how much regular thought, care, and coordination are needed to tend to a growing learning community: from regularly updating our curriculum, to offering ongoing training and support to our teachers, to strengthening our post-B'nei Mitzvah teen programs, and more. We are thrilled with the leadership Mike Roe has been able to provide to bring us to this point and thrilled that he is staying on to teach at Society Hill Synagogue.

Given that Mike is a full-time teacher at a Philadelphia public school, we have invested in our future by bringing on Karen Hafter to be our full-time Director of Youth and Family Education, overseeing our Hebrew School. Karen, a third-generation Society Hill Synagogue member, brings a range of teaching skills and experiences, and an abundance of energy and creativity, to our school.

In addition to investing in the human beings who help bring talent and leadership to this congregation, we are also taking stock of how our physical space does or does not align with the growth trajectory of this community. As Hebrew School class sizes grow and our Playschool once again approaches capacity limits

for early childhood education enrollment, and as we add staff to our synagogue, we are exploring the relationship between our space and the growth of this community — and whether there are any measures we need to take to increase our space capacity.

Similarly, as we grow, we want to be sure that we are devoting volunteer time and energy toward ensuring that part of what people find appealing about us — warmth and connection — continues to be a strength. We will look to our Membership Committee and our God's Unfinished Business Committee and subcommittees to continue to help us foster one-to-one connections and to help people feel welcome in this community.

We know the future is never guaranteed. We know growth today does not guarantee growth tomorrow. Still, we want to understand how and why Society Hill Synagogue is serving as a draw to people, both preand post-October 7, 2023.

We want to know in what ways we at Society Hill Synagogue are advancing our mission successfully and where there is still room to do it better. We want to set ourselves up so that as new members of the broader community find us, we are able to receive them with love and care, so that they, too, can experience the strength, nourishment, and inspiration we provide here at Society Hill Synagogue.

Thank you to each of you for making that possible.

Israel Dialogue and Engagement Subcommittee (IDEC)

HOLDING DIALOGUE, HONORING DIFFERENCE

The IDEC is a subcommittee of the Society Hill Synagogue Israel Committee. The IDEC was formed in September 2024 in response to the diverse and often complex emotions experienced by congregants regarding Israel and the Middle East. In your relationships with friends, coworkers, synagogue members, and/or family members, you may have experienced disagreements and even anguish regarding this topic. The IDEC aims to foster improved understanding, dialogue, and compassion for one another.

Our Purpose

The IDEC's mission is to create a supportive environment for our congregants to affirm Jewish American identity, engage in meaningful discussions, and explore their relationship with Israel. Specifically, we hope to:

- Foster safe spaces for open dialogue about Jewish American identity and connections to Israel.
- 2. Enhance understanding of Jewish history and values as context for challenges.
- 3. Provide tools to navigate the complexities of being Jewish Americans, particularly regarding Israel and the broader Jewish community.
- 4. Deepen the bonds of the Society Hill Synagogue congregation *Kehilah*.

Congregation Survey

In October and November 2024, the IDEC conducted an anonymous survey of synagogue members about their connection to Israel, the effects on their lives of the October 7 attacks, their thoughts and feelings about current conflicts in Israel and Gaza, and their desire to talk with fellow congregants about these issues.

We extend our heartfelt thanks to the 145 members (about a 20% response rate) who participated in our survey. They answered questions about their connection to Israel, the effects on their lives of the current conflicts in Israel and Gaza, and their desire to talk with fellow congregants about their reactions and feelings and/or to learn more about these issues.

The IDEC members read all the responses, analyzed the data using simple numeric summaries of a few questions and, to minimize any biases of the team, used an artificial intelligence content analysis of responses to other questions.

Israel Listening Circles

The purpose of Israel Listening Circles is to create safe spaces for Society Hill Synagogue congregants to listen and express their thoughts, feelings, and fears regarding what has happened in Israel and Gaza, and how it has impacted our lives as Jewish Americans. Inspired by successful programs at Germantown Jewish Centre, the Israel Listening Circles reflect Society Hill Synagogue's values of respect for diverse opinions and beliefs. Israel Listening Circles are not debate forums or places for problem-solving. Participants take turns speaking while others quietly listen without correction or judgment.

ISRAEL AT 77: A NIGHT OF MEMORY, MUSIC, AND MEANING

As Israel transitioned on April 30 from the grief of Yom HaZikaron, Remembrance Day for Israel's Fallen Soldiers and Victims of Terrorism, to the joy of Yom Ha'Atzma'ut, Israel's Independence Day, we held a special event honoring both here at Society Hill Synagogue.

The solemn and moving program began in the Sanctuary with a presentation explaining and reflecting on these two significant days in the Israeli calendar, followed by the lighting of Yahrzeit candles. Participants watched a video showcasing the faces and names of fallen Israeli soldiers who have lost their lives since October 7, 2023.

The program included Yizkor and El Maleh Rahamim prayers in English and Hebrew. We also heard letters from two soldiers written before they made the ultimate sacrifice for their country, read aloud by members of our community. Additionally, we enjoyed a special reading of Eli Mohar's poem, "Yoram," and listened to a recording of the poem set to music by Israeli artist Yehuda Poliker. A siren marked a moment of silence, as observed across Israel, before concluding with "Hatikvah" ("The Hope"), Israel's national anthem.

After the program, we gathered in the Social Hall to celebrate Israel's 77th year of independence. We enjoyed a delicious dinner including locally made falafel, salads, and burekas, and made-in-Israel chocolates and halvah. Backgammon sets, known in Israel as Shesh Besh, were also available. Some participants completed a giant Israeli map puzzle. We also watched a video loop that included photos of Society Hill Synagogue members who had traveled to Israel, scenes from the country, and interesting facts about Israel.

We want to extend our thanks to Val and Michael Yasner, Ira Kauderwood, Rob Einhorn, Fran Gallun, Lisa Eizen, Rafi Licht, Rabbi Nathan Kamesar, Sahar Oz, LilyFish Gomberg, Ana Atach, and Rachel Howe for their participation and assistance with the program.

In early April, in partnership with the Young Friends (20s-30s), we

presented an Israeli Happy Hour to learn about Birthright Israel opportunities for young adults up to age 40. Jordan Davis, our guest speaker, shared her journey from growing up in Wyoming to experiencing antisemitism at the University of Pennsylvania since October 7. She discussed how her Birthright experience has shaped her Jewish identity. The evening included Israeli beer and treats. Rob Einhorn organized the program with Young Friends Co-Chair Alexis Rosen.

During Kiddush lunch following Shabbat services on Saturday, July 26, we will present a screening of a new documentary about Road to Recovery, an NGO through which Israelis drive Palestinian patients to and from border crossings for treatment in Israeli hospitals. Road to Recovery was one of the organizations in our 5785 High Holiday Israel appeal, and the film's director, Udi Ben Seadia, will be our guest on July 26.

J.Proud is headed by Galia Godel, the program manager for the LGBTQ Initiative of Jewish Family and Children's Service. Galia will present a program,

legal and social changes

Our Interfaith Inclusion Subcommittee's March 15 Lunch 'n' Learn panel discussion on experiences with conversion was very well attended, heartfelt, engaging, and thought provoking. Overwhelmingly positive feedback to the event supports the need to continue to explore matters of interfaithness. One congregant in the audience who openly shared a personal experience later offered that "until I stood up there with a mic, I didn't realize how important it is to me, as a convert, to be able to be my full self. The program... helped make that possible."

The Subcommittee for the Inclusion of People of Color is exploring a screening and discussion session for next year, building on the successful similar program we held last fall. Hearing from someone outside of our community, while we are building internal understanding and momentum, is helpful to bring needed perspective. We are also very interested in learning from people of color in our synagogue community and about their experiences at Society Hill Synagogue regarding feelings of belonging.

Social Action Committee

LITERACY, IMMIGRATION, AND **ENERGY JUSTICE** by Steve Morley

The Social Action Committee continues its mission of repairing the world. Thanks to everyone who participated in our Social Action Survey. The two top issues for engagement were immigration and literacy.

Even before the survey results were tabulated, the committee sponsored a Lunch 'n' Learn on April 26 featuring Larry Abrams of BookSmiles and kicked off a book drive to support children's literacy. BookSmiles donates books to children for whom books are not a regular part of life and does this through donations of all books.

Kids' books that are in good shape will go to kids who need them. Adult books are sold, and funds are used to purchase books for kids. Any unusable and unsellable books are sold for pulp, and the proceeds go toward purchasing books for kids — the ultimate in reuse, recycle, and repurpose! If you missed the book drive through which our congregation collected and donated more than 5,000 books — you can bring books directly to BookSmiles in Pennsauken. For more information, check out BookSmiles' website. We plan to continue Society Hill Synagogue's involvement with BookSmiles.

Look for announcements in the future on immigration initiatives at Society Hill Synagogue. In the meantime, our congregation continues to help with voter registration of new citizens at naturalization ceremonies. Please join our efforts by contacting the Pennsylvania **Immigration & Citizenship** Coalition (PIC) online here.

POWER's Climate Justice and Jobs Team works for affordable, renewable energy for everyone in two ways. First, the PGW Transition Team works to align Philadelphia Gas Works (PGW) with Philadelphia's goals for clean, affordable energy. The team is fighting against excessive rate increases and against seasonal, unpredictable rate increases during warm winters that yield lower-thanexpected revenues for PGW. These rate increases unfairly burden low-income households. which already spend about 10% of their income on energy.



Second, the People's Energy Plan focuses on affordable renewable electricity for everyone — including strengthening our local electric grid in hotter summers and more extreme storms and protecting all neighborhoods from outages. We are working with officials at the state Public Utility Commission, which will decide this fall how to ensure utilities adopt plans to make the local electric grid more resilient. We're working to build more public input and accountability — more democracy — into the system we all pay for through our electric bills. To learn more, contact: power@

BOOK CLUB by Donna Tartasky

We've just wrapped up another great year of the Society Hill Synagogue Book Club!

Attendance has grown, with 10 to 16 participants regularly joining our lively discussions. A recent highlight was author **Esther Safran Foer** joining us via Zoom to discuss her memoir, *I* Want You to Know We're Still Here, which sparked a meaningful conversation.

On June 6, we're excited to welcome Molly Golubcow, who will lead a discussion about her book, The Hotel on St. James Place: Growing Up in Atlantic City Between the Boardwalk and the Holocaust.

Looking ahead to the fall, we have a wonderful lineup of books. On **Friday, September 12**, we'll meet to discuss *The Wolf Hunt* by Ayelet Gundar-

Goshen. On October 10, our selection is The Secret Chord by Geraldine Brooks. November 14 will feature The Family: Three Journeys into the Heart of the Twentieth Century by David Laskin. Our December 12 book is still to be announced.

In the fall, we hope to meet in the front of the Sanctuary to accommodate our readers with mobility challenges.

ROSH HODESH GROUP by Rachel Howe

What a great first year this has been for the Rosh Hodesh group! A rotating group of about 30 women have met nearly every month since Elul to discuss issues and topics related to the month and to women and Judaism. Sometimes we focus on the holidays of the month; other topics have included — or will include — the concept of Rosh Hodesh, women's Yiddish prayers called tehines, women's past and present connection to Torah, and coming of age and the Bat Mitzvah. Often beginning with a short teaching, we usually break into small groups to reflect on how these topics affect us personally. Sometimes we incorporate creative activities like writing, and we hope to add other modalities in the future.

Over this first year, we've developed a strong but flexible structure that includes ritual

elements — like lighting candles and saying a blessing — to frame our ever-changing topics. The format also allows for lay leadership. Each month is led by a different community member or pair, offering a range of perspectives. We started with committee members leading and then invited regular attendees to contribute — and they have stepped up in wonderful ways! I'm excited about all of our upcoming topics and leaders.

Perhaps the most important part of our gatherings is the time we spend socializing. As we gather around tea and cookies to welcome each new month, members exchange hugs and catch up. At the end, people are often reluctant to leave, staying to continue the conversation or to compliment one another on what was shared. We get to know each other in a different

way and feel bonded by the shared and varied experiences of Jewish womanhood.

Looking ahead, we have some exciting plans. In the fall, we'll host a special event during Tuesday Hebrew School, inviting girls and non-binary students approaching B'nei Mitzvah to join us for an intergenerational discussion on Jewish coming of age. We're also working with Rabbi Kamesar and Hazzan Jessi to plan a women's "takeover" of a Shabbat service in 2026. In preparation, Hazzan Jessi will lead several Rosh Hodesh gatherings to help us grow into that moment.

The Rosh <u>H</u>odesh committee has been amazing and dedicated, and our regulars have made this a warm and welcoming space. I'm so excited for what's ahead in year two!
