

# SHS President's State of the Synagogue Address Jeremey Newberg

## **September 16, 2021**

Two years ago, I shared with you that SHS is changing with a new generation of leadership, new members, a major building expansion, and new approaches to Jewish communal life. It was a time of great optimism. Last year, I shared with you, "COVID Social Distancing is disruptive to our Jewish communal life." I also said: "We are Jews; we adjust and make the best of the situation."

SHS is an example of how a community with shared values has grown in a thoughtful, caring, and connected manner. David Ben-Gurion said: "Anyone who doesn't believe in miracles is not a realist." It is my pleasure to share with you some of the realities we addressed and the miracles we experienced within the SHS community this past year.

I am most proud that no one got seriously ill from COVID as we incrementally and methodically returned to in-person activities. Our goal was to be transparent and inclusive in our decisions and communicate with clarity and frequency. The rise of the Delta variant forced us to conduct a last-minute poll to see who felt comfortable with in-person or remote participation in High Holiday services. This hybrid approach is the result of your input. Here we are. The bigger point is that SHS remains a vital part of your life. You all support SHS with your time, insights, love, and care so we may thrive as a vibrant Jewish community.

We are resilient. We will continue to thoughtfully respond to a changing COVID environment. We will also, with clear intentions, move forward in alignment with our values.

Our membership has grown from 295 households last year to 301. With the improved facilities and a return to in-person activities, we expect this to continue to grow.

## B. Religious Observance and Services During COVID

In the spring and summer, we thoughtfully and incrementally returned to a mix of inperson services while maintaining remote access via Zoom. We upgraded our audio-visual

experience with a "we learn as we go approach." This venture is the result of close coordination
among clergy, staff, and our Religion Committee, Building and Security Committee, and

- Libby Cone and Steve and Wendy Greenspan for their leadership with Torah study and POWER;
- Joanna and Micah Hart, who organize the vibrant Young Families Group. This is how young kids and parents deepen their bonds to SHS and their Jewish identities.

## C. Social Action and Community

#### **D.** Education and Programming

With the completion of the Paula Kline Learning Center, we were able to grow from three Playschool classes serving 43 children to five serving 58 children in the 2021-2022 school year, including a new class for toddlers as young as 18 months old and a second class for 3-4 year-olds. We plan to add a 6<sup>th</sup> class to start in June 2022. Over half of our Playschool families are also synagogue members.

Our new three-story learning center and nearly 1,000 square foot rear yard have made a monumental impact on our ability to serve Playschool, Hebrew School, and Adult Education.

We are excited to welcome back our Hebrew School students for in-person learning with masks, primarily outdoors in our various tents in the rear yard and on Lawrence Court, with indoor learning resuming as vaccinations become available for children across younger ages.

This year, we have launched the Immersive Shabbat Hebrew School experience, moving the weekend day of Hebrew School from Sunday to Saturday. Now with, the Paula Kline Learning Center, we have the space to do this. As part of the Shabbat school day, we will bring together our students, their parents, and our congregants across generations in the Sanctuary. Very cool!

Thank you to Lilli Klotz Foster, Assistant Director of Education for Playschool, and Mike Roe, Assistant Director of Education for Hebrew School, and their teams of teachers, for successfully guiding our schools through such a challenging and unpredictable year with diligence, sensitivity, and passion for our schools and synagogue.

#### E. COVID-19 Risk Mitigation and Safety Committee

The SHS COVID-19 Risk Mitigation and Safety Committee helps our staff, clergy, and Board understand the risks and opportunities to mitigate such risks as we navigate the pandemic while continuing to be a full-service synagogue. SHS follows COVID risk mitigation guidelines provided by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the City of Philadelphia. Executive Director Sahar Oz, the Playschool staff, and our custodial team have done a remarkable job of messaging and practicing COVID health and safety guidelines. Parents and caregivers, and our sweet children, have followed the protocols. We are applying the lessons we learned from that experience to the next level of return to in-person activities with services and Hebrew School. So far, so good.

### F. Finances

The combination of the Caring Kehillah Fund, two cash infusions from the SBA Paycheck Protection Program, a modest increase in dues, and fierce cost cutting from our Finance Committee, staff, and clergy resulted in a balanced budget. Thank you to our Treasurer, Brian Mono, and the members of the Finance Committee, as well as Rabbi Kamesar, Sahar Oz, and Rhonda Bello, who are vital to the safe and sound management of SHS finances.

Membership dues, Playschool tuition, and annual giving are the drivers to keep SHS on a sound financial footing. We are grateful that all of you continue to support the SHS community. We continue to honor your investment by serving as thoughtful stewards of synagogue finances.

#### G. Facilities
